**EDITOR'S NOTE** – The 1950s saw the rise of an entirely new *genre* of hearses, ambulances, combinations, and service cars built on unaltered original-wheelbase passenger -car chassis. While OWB Chevrolet and Pontiac sedan-delivery conversions were popular first-call car and economy ambulance conversions in the late 1940s and early `50s, Henney upped the ante with its raised-roof 1952-54 *Henney Junior* series on a 127" chassis. For 1959, Flxible introduced its short wheelbase, high-headroom Buick *Flx-ette.* Cotner/Bevington countered with its compact Oldsmobile *Seville* in 1960 and National, Memphian, Pinner, and Weller also charged into the OWB coach fray. Industry leader Superior was late to the party with its 1961 Pontiac *Consort.* Tom McPherson covers all of these in his information-packed secondary feature in this issue.
