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The Eureka Company of Rock Falls Illinois COVER PHOTO - When announced that its 1957 professional cars were "all new", that advertising slogan: they really were! The hollow were the company's first built with all-steel had finally abandoned the wood-framed body Eureka construction it had used since the company started building hearses and ambulances away back in the 'teens. Even the Cadillac which the company mounted its hearse, commercial chassis on ambulance, combination and flower car bodies was completely new this year. The all-new Cadillac Series 57-86 commercial chassis "X"-frame instead of the usual new design box/perimeter frame. Our cover photo is of Mount Lebanon PA member John R. INSIDE BACK COVER - The was was over, and U.S. funeral coach and ambulance manufacturers were scrambling to meet pent-up demand for new hearses and ambulances. It was a seller's market. The Meteor Motor Car Company of Piqua, Ohio ran this striking black-and-white ad which featured a unique aerial view of three limousine-style coaches, in funeral service trade journals. The coach lamp mounted on the upper front door was a Meteor coach trademark from 1941 until 1953. In late 1956, Meteor merged with the A.J. Miller Co. to form Miller-Meteor. BACK COVER - The 1977 model year was an epochal one for the U.S. professional car industry, which "downsized" all of its cars in line with the auto industry downsizing mandated by new government fuel economy standards. Superior, Miller-Meteor and S&S all introduced significantly smaller hearses and ambulances this year. The "Owner's Pride" subject in this issue is Michigan PCS member Warren Waterman's 1977 Miller-Meteor Cadillac Lifeliner Hightop Ambulance. Downsizing eventually killed off the classic passenger car-based ambulance -- and Miller-Meteor, which went out of business at the end of the 1979 model year.
