INSIDE BACK COVER - In 1960 a new name – Cotner/Bevington -- was added to the list of American professional car manufacturers. Based in Blytheville, Arkansas, C/B was actually a new name for an established firm, Comet Coach, which sold the Comet name to the Ford Motor Company to use on a new line of 1961 Mercury compact cars. Cotner/Bevington was later acquired by Wayne Corp. and became a lower-priced companion line for Miller-Meteor. Comet and C/B built principally on Oldsmobile chassis.
