History and Purpose of The Miller-Meteor Chapter

The Professional Car Society, Inc. granted a charter for this, The

Miller-Meteor Chapter, in August of 2002 pursuant to a petition signed by PCS members Larri Dirks, Chuck Kramer, Jon Wurm, Dennis Goethe, and myself. Based on feedback we'd received from fellow PCS members, combined with our strong personal interests and ties to Miller-Meteor vehicles, we were pleased to have established an organization that would facilitate the coming together of like-minded Miller-Meteor enthusiasts.

What we did next was team up with former Miller-Meteor executive, Tom Caserta, and proceed to co-host not one but two Miller-Meteor Reunions in the Piqua, Ohio area. These events, held in 2004 and 2007, made more of an impact than simply bringing some hearses and ambulances back to their "birthplace." These reunions brought dozens of people together to truly celebrate the Miller-Meteor heritage. Many of these people were Miller-Meteor retirees who still live in the Piqua area. Our first Reunion was even attended by two greatgranddaughters of A.J. Miller! Imagine enthusiastic Miller-Meteor collectors from all over the country converging on Piqua, joined by the men and women who so proudly crafted these cars we now cherish. For many of these retirees, this was the first time they'd had an avenue to relive those Miller-Meteor days and they loved every minute of sharing the stories with us.

Now, we're going to do it all again. That's right, a THIRD Miller-Meteor Reunion! This one will be bittersweet from the sense that it marks the 30th anniversary of Miller-Meteor's closing in 1979. Nevertheless, PCS members will once again make the trek to Piqua to spend a few exciting days with the folks from Miller-Meteor while participating in the city's Heritage Festival. When the Miller-Meteor Chapter was formed, a decision quickly made was the name of this newsletter. 1973 Miller-Meteor Cadillac Volunteer Ambulance Owned by Dr. David Richards Bloomfield Hills, Michigan



This 1973 Miller-Meteor Cadillac Volunteer 48" ambulance -- the first ever purchased by Washington County Ambulance Service (WCAS) -- originally served a spacious area surrounding the small community of Akron, Colorado, located northeast of Denver. It was used there actively, accumulating close to 100,000 miles in the process, from 1973 until 1985. Subsequent to the ambulance's retirement from active duty, it has been owned, preserved and well maintained -- attested to by the remarkable condition it remains in today! -- by Professional Car Society members Fred McPeck -- whose company originally sold the car to WCAS in July 1973 -- as well as by Tom Hutton and Tim Fantin... prior to joining Dr. Richards' collection of vintage EMS vehicles in 2008.

Part of the excitement that comes with preserving old ambulances is the search for photos taken of the cars when they were new and during their years of service. Dr. Richards obtained the above photo from Fred McPeck. He received it from fellow PCS member and long-standing friend, Jim LoSasso. Jim, who worked for the Denver-based McPeck Motor Coach Company in the 1970s, snapped this photo of the car on the McPeck lot, just prior to delivery to the original owner (WCAS) on July 27, 1973.

The Volunteer was one of three emergency ambulance offerings from Miller-Meteor in 1973. It was the mid-range car, in popular demand between the Lifeliner with 54-inches of headroom in the patient area, and the standard roofline Guardian, featuring 43-inches of rear headroom.. These were beautifully styled cars that, according to the 1973 Miller-Meteor ambulance catalog, "have the steadiness, stability and soft ride needed to protect patients from travel-induced aggravation of injury.

Shown above is the emergency center of this fully-equipped ambulance. Note the abundance of storage space, thanks to the custom-designed partition dispensary and right rear wheel-house cabinets. There is stretcher storage under the rear floor and plenty of space for linens behind the tambour roll-up door in the bulkhead. One would expect nothing less than the perfectly folded, color coordinated cot blankets and linens in an impeccable ambulance such as this.

The front interior (below) is appropriately finished in Cordovan vinyl with a deluxe twotone seat pattern. Notice the General Electric 2-way communications radio, dash mounted Phillips intercom system, and color coordinated floor mats. This ambulance is equipped with a dual battery system, evidenced by the presence of the large, round Cole-Hersee switch mounted on the transmission hump. Dashboard vents indicate optional air conditioning.
